WILLIAM YOUNG--Tackle, 240 pounds, 6 ft. 1 in. From Alabama. Played on Navy all-star eleven at Honolulu last year.

PAUL STENN--Tackle 235 pounds, 6 ft. 3 in. Learned his football under Clipper Smith at Villanova.

DONALD AVERY--Tackle, 245 pounds, 6 ft. 4 in. Played for U.S.C. before joining Army.

JOHN STEBER--Guard, 220 pounds, 6 ft. Third Vanderbilt man on squad.

ALBERT COUPEE--Back, 224 pounds, 6 ft. Played at Iowa.
