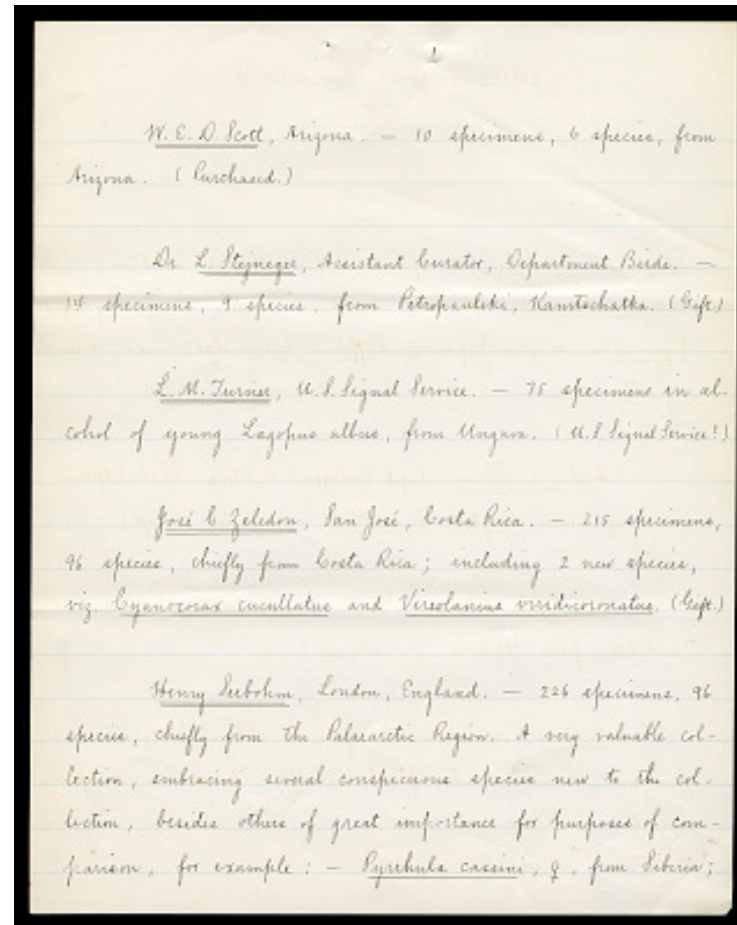
W. E. D. Scott, Arizona. - 10 specimens, 6 species, from Arizona. (Purchased.)

Dr. L. Stejneger, Assistant Curator, Department Birds. - 14 specimens, 9 species, from Petropaulski, Kamtschatka. (Gift.)

L. M. Turner, U. S. Signal Service. - 75 specimens in alcohol of young *Lagopus albus*, from Ungava. (U. S. Signal Service?)

José C. Zeledón, San José, Costa Rica. - 215 specimens, 96 species, chiefly from Costa Rica; including 2 new species, viz. *Cyanocorax cucullatus* and *Vireolanius viridicoronatus*. (Gift.)

Henry Seebohm, London, England. - 226 specimens, 96 species, chiefly from the Palearctic Region. A very valuable collection, embracing several conspicuous species new to the collection, besides others of great importance for purposes of comparison, for example: - *Pyrrhula cassini*, ♀, from Siberia;
