Scammon, is frankly in favor of doing everything he can to help Natural History in the abstract, and is particularly well disposed toward K. and myself personally. The Captain wishes to make a name, which is our point of advantage. W. H. Hyde Esq. is fallen and now of no account. Dr. Henry M. Fisher, of New York, Surgeon of the Expedition is a low, cunning, grasping man of loose habits, whose weak point is his conceit. He always impresses his importance upon every one, and deigns to patronize Natural Science occasionally. He is a snag of which I wish we were well rid. The subordinate officers, are a set of the usual fast young men of no particular forte some of whom may and have helped us, but most of whom find it fashionable and easy to deride Natural History, always beginning and ending with "bugs." The subordinate marine officers are more with us than otherwise, following after the Captain. I have been transferred to this service and am now acting as Purser to this vessel.
