Dear Mr. Studensky; -

As I stated to you several days ago, I attended the creditors meeting at Akron on the 19th inst., Dr. Silverston, Mr. Sheets, and Mr. Lenhart were examined and we found that Dr. Silverston claimed that the company owned buildings and scrap metal worth possibly \$6000.00 in Milwaukee, Wisc., however, Mr. Wilcox, the attorney for the temporary Receiver stated that their attorneys had investigated this matter and found that all the property was heavily mortgaged and that there would not be enough after the sale to pay the wages of the watchman.

The debts of the concern amount to \$15,286.69. Of course, \$10,000.00 is your suit for damages.
