The Emperor of Austria Visits Prague - Victor Emanuel to Make a Formal Entry into Venice on the 17th of November - Recognition of the Hospodar by the Sultan - Reported Burning of a Ship - Condition of the Empress Charlotte Considered Hopeless - Probable Return of Maximilian in an Austrian Frigate now on her way to Mexico.

LIVERPOOL, Friday, October 26. - The steamship Bremen from New York October 13th, arrived here to-day, [[italics]] en route [[/italics]] to Bremen.

PRAGUE, October 25. - The Emperor of Austria has reached this city and met with a highly favorable reception from the people and the officials.

FLORENCE, October 25. - King Victor Emanuel will make his formal entry in the city of Venice on the 17th of November.

CONSTANTINOPLE, October 25. - The Sultan has formally recognized the Hospador, and given him a reception at his palace.

LONDON, October 26 - Report current here today that the Tycoon of Japan is dead.

LIVERPOOL, Friday, October 26. An arriv here reports that the ship Saginaw, Boutelle, from Cardiff, September for Panama, was burned at sea. No date - no lives lost.

QUEENSTOWN. October 26 - Evening. - The Cunard steamship Persia, from New York, October 17, arrived here to-day [[italics]] en route [[/italics]] to Liverpool.

PARIS, October 26. - There is great anxiety France in regard to the condition of the Lvon workmen.

LONDON, October 26. - The London [[italics]] Globe [[/italics]] in editorial article, alludes to the designed intention by the courts of Prussia and Sweden to abso Denmark.

PARIS, October 26. - The condition of the Empress Charlotte is described as being hopeless.

The Emperor Maximilian will probably return in the Austrian frigate, which was recently despatched from Trieste by the Emperor Franc



It is said that twenty war steamers will leave for Mexico in November to bring home the entire French force now in that country.
