9.13.69. | 94 * Matthews, J.H. | 23 Wayne St. Baltimore, Md. Sept. 10th 1869. Applies for appointment as teacher.

9.15.69. | 95 * Morris Susan | 9 Angle St. Providence, R.I. Sept. 13th 1869. Renews her application for reappointment as teacher at Oak Hill, Md.

9.18.69. | 96 * Maddox, E.J. | Powhatan Court House, Va. Sept. 15th 1869. Requests to be furnished with book on Country School Houses and Churches.

9.21.69. | 97 * McComas, G.M. E.B.#235 Vol.1.1869. | Baltimore, Md. Sept. 18th 1869. Encloses bills for material and labor amounting to \$137.02/100, used in construction of School-house at Hendon Hill, Harford Co. Md. Hopes that the Bureau will allow the people at least \$100 of this sum. States that there is a place named Fairview, about three miles from Hendon Hill, where a school has been kept in a damp cellar: that they have the ground for school-house, and some funds. Inquires if material can be furnished them?

9.25.69. | 98 * McComas, G.M. | Baltimore, Md. Sept. 24th 1869. States in reply to letter of the 23d inst. that the material for the desks is not yet purchased: that the material would be but a small item: it is the work that costs. Inquires if he shall see what the material for desks will cost, and add the cost of singles, lime &c.?

- | 99. * McComas, G.M. | Baltimore, Md. Sept. 30th 1869. States in reply to letter of the 29th inst. that he has forwarded the letter with instructions: that Rev. Geo. Dougherty of Bel Air, is the principal trustee: that he has ordered to have the Desks made as early as possible, &c. &c.

10.4.69. | 100 * Matthews, W.H. | Martinsburg, W. Va. Oct. 2d 1869. States in reply, that Miss Brackett will open school in a few days: that their school-house is too small. Inquires if some means cannot suggested by which the children call all be accommodated.

10.9.69. | 101 * Mitchell, James & other School Trustees | St. Michaels, Talbot Co. Md. Oct. 6th 1869. State that they are in great need of school-desks, and request to be furnished with two dozen.

11.30.69. | 103 * McComas, G.M. | 9 South Liberty St. Baltimore, Md. Nov. 29th 1869. Returns vouchers signed.

12.2.69. | 104 * Morse, Wm. S. | Washington, D.C. Nov. 27th 1869. Recommends that aid be furnished Robt. Terrell & others in establishing a Sunday school at Kendall Green. Endorsed by John F. Cook and J.S.H. Winfield.

12.7.69. | 105 Morris, Susan Teacher | Poolsville, Montgomery Co. Md. Dec. 2d 1869. Requests to be supplied with books to the amount of \$2.31/100, which will balance her account to Dec. 1st.

12.28.69. | 106 * Morsell, Joshua & James | Huntingtown, Calvert Co. Md. Dec. 19th 1869. State that their teacher neglects his pupils, and is in the habit of leaving his school &c. Request to have another teacher sent in his place.
