

Dear Bro. By letters from the student teachers, I find there is some derangement as to ordering books. I thought it best in making out their commissions,— to have them order from only one source. I chose a Phila house, & was confirmed in my choice by the fact that a house in Baltimore or Washington declined Mr. Gregory's request to furnish these young men with books. Others complain of high prices on the part of the Phila house. We are sorry there should be any delay. We are withholding portions of their salary. We need blanks for teacher's reports, badly.
