
Sir,

I reply to your letter of the 2nd instant, that if the person who is solemnizing the marriage is a United States officer and issues the certificate in the discharge of his official duties, or if the certificate is to be returned to some public officer to constitute part of a public record, no stamp is necessary, but if it is to be delivered to and returned by the parties, a five cent stamp should be affixed.
