AUGUST WILSON (Playwright) is the author of Jitney, Ma Rainey's Black Bottom, Fences, Joe Turner's Come and Gone, The Piano Lesson, Two Trains Running, Seven Guitars and King Hedley II. These works explore the heritage and experience of African Americans, decade-by-decade, over the course of the twentieth century. Mr. Wilson's work has garnered many awards including Pulitzer Prizes for Fences (1987) and The Piano Lesson (1990), a Tony Award for Fences, Great Britain's Olivier Award for Jitney as well as seven New York Drama Critics Circle Awards. Additionally, the cast recording of Ma Rainey's Black Bottom received a 1985 Grammy Award. Mr. Wilson has received many fellowships and awards, including Rockefeller and Guggenheim Fellowships and the Whiting Writers' Award. He was awarded a National Humanities Medal by the President of the United States and has received numerous honorary degrees, including the only high school diploma ever issued by Pittsburgh's Carnegie Library. He is an alumnus of New Dramatists and a member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters. Mr. Wilson was born in Pittsburgh's Hill District and currently makes his home in Seattle. He is the father of two daughters, Sakina Ansari and Azula Carmen Wilson, and is married to costume designer Constanza Romero.
