This club house will be heated with the latest heating system, he states. A membership drive will be under way within a short time. The club is open to those who are fond of riding sports. Rates, \$1.00 per hour, open every day from 6 a.m. Sundays from 5 a.m. (Follow this route to the HILL CREST: take Manchester road to Geyer, turn left on Geyer to Monroe, turn right on Monroe to the Club House). -Photos by Davenport.


