Mr. Dante was represented on Broadway by The Mighty Gents.

With three theatres under one roof on East 73rd St., the MTC has won numerous awards. Now in its sixth season, under the artistic directorship of Lynne Meadow, MTC has distinguished itself with such acclaimed productions as Ashes by David Rudkin, The Mighty Gents (formerly The Last Street Play) by Richard Wesley, and the off-Broadway hit Starting Here, Starting Now. Others include Corinne Jackers award-winning Bits And Pieces, Athol Fugard's The Blood Knot, Terrance McNally's Bad Habits, Milan Stitt's The Runner Stumbles, Mark Medoff's The Wager and David Storey's Life Class.
