The first Tony Awards were made at a dinner in the Grand Ballroom of the Waldorf Astoria on Easter Sunday, April 6, 1947.

Dear PLAYBILL: When the late Gower Champion won a Tony Award for The Happy Time, he made an amusing comment about the critic Clive Barnes, but I can't remember what he said.

In 1968, Gower Champion won two Tonys one for direction and one for choreography for The Happy Time. When accepting his Tony for choreography, Mr. Champion said: "I don't know how to break this to Clive Barnes." (Mr. Barnes, in his review of this musical, criticized Champion for attempting to do a "proper ballet" in the show. "Mr. Champion might do best," he wrote, "to stick to staging at which he is a master and leave choreography to someone else.")
