GEORGE G. NORMAN, COLONEL, USAF, 1201A

"Norm" was born 7th of June 1911, and calls Bloomington, Ind. his home. He attended the Univ. of Indiana graduating in 1934, receiving at the same time a commission as 2nd Lieutenant in the Inf. Res. Was Called to Active Duty in 1939 and transferred to the Air Corps in 1940. Having flown as a civilian for several years he was awarded his pilot wings in 1941. He served as adjutant and sqdn commander at Chanute Field in 1940 and as a contract supervisor in California in 1941. In 1942 he was assigned to the Glider training program and became Base Executive officer at Fort Sumner, N. M. remaining in that capacity at the Advanced Twin Engine Flying School there. In June 1944 he was ordered overseas with the Air Transport Command to North Africa. He served as a Base Commander during his entire overseas tour of 19 months at Atar, Bahrain Island, Fort Lyautey, and Dakar. He returned to the U. S in 1946 reporting for duty in the Air Inspectors Office of the Headquarters Air Transport Command.
