Annual Fredrick Douglass Awards Dinner

The Annual Fredrick Douglass Awards Dinner keeps the ideals and spirit of a great man alive within the New York Urban League. The Dinner commemorates a vigilant abolitionist, editor, orator, statesman, and prophet. The award is inscribed," I know of no rights of race superior to those of humanity." These immortal words of Douglass set a keynote for the Urban League's various humanitarian programs.

The Classic is an important additional funding source for League programs.
