LILLIAN COSBY-Celebrated by the media for her clairvoyant feats, the uncanny accuracy of Lillian's psychic predictions, and her collection of famous clientele, have sometimes overshadowed her other achievements.

He was elected a vice president of Phillip Morris Incorporated in March 1978 and has served on the board of directors for Miller since 1972.

Shropshire began his career with Phillip Morris Incorporated in 1952 as a sales representative in Brooklyn, N.Y. He was a college supervisor from 1953 to 1960. In 1961, he was appointed export representative for Phillip Morris International and was responsible for organizing and supervising distributions and sales for the company's products in Senegal, Mali, Portuguese Guinea, Gambia, Sierra Leone, Liberia, Ivory Coast, Ghana, Togo Dahomey, Nigeria, Cameroon, Fernando Po, Central African Republic, Republic of Congo, Zaire, Upper Volta, Chad, Niger and Cape Verde Islands.

He served as sales manager for Tropical Africa from 1963 to 1966 and in 1967, he was appointed coordinator for Africa. From 1968 to 1972, he was chairman and managing director of Phillip Morris Nigeria and was responsible for the manufacturing and marketing operations of Nigeria's market. While serving in Nigeria, he served on the court of governors of the University of Lagos Medical School, Nigerian National Swimming Association, American Chamber of Commerce and the African Committee.

Born in Little Rock, Ark., Shropshire attended Lincoln University, Jefferson City, Mo. and the Graduate School of Business at New York University.

Shropshire is currently a board member of the Miller Foundation, Key Banks, Inc., Albany, N.Y., The Seven Up Company, St. Louis, Mo., and Athletes for Youth, Milwaukee, Wis. He is also a member of the executive board of YMCA of Metropolitan Milwaukee and the advisory council of the W. Paul Stillman School of Business at Seton Hall University. He is also active in the Milwaukee Urban League. In addition, he is a member of the NAACP, Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity, American Marketing Association, International Advertising Association and the National Association of Market Developers.

Shropshire received the Lincoln University Distinguished Alumni Award in 1974 and an honorary doctorate of law from Lincoln University in 1980. In 1975, Shropshire was honored by the Chicago Conference for Brotherhood; in 1976, he was named "Man of the Year" by Hucksters International and in 1977, he received the Philadelphia Tribune Charities Humanitarian Award. He received the following distinctions in 1979: Omega Psi Phi Community Award, NAACP Freedom Award for Business, Ebony's American Black Achievement Award for Business and the B'Nai B'Rith Human Rights Award.

Dr. Pollock spent a year at the Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies and has also given lectures at Michigan, Columbia, and Harvard universities and has received several grants from the Social Science Research Council. Formerly Senior Editor of the journal Studies in Comparative International Development, he was the first chairman of the Committee on the U.S. Press and Latin America of the National Latin American Studies Association, charged with improving U.S. coverage of the hemisphere. He has published several articles on political socialization, mass media and social change. His articles are to be found in The Nation, Society, Worldview, Journalism Quarterly, and Communications Yearbook.

Dr. Pollock has traveled extensively, spending a year as a Maxwell School (Syracuse University) intern in the U.S. Consulate in Bombay, India; a year completing doctoral research on elite government officials in Bogota, Colombia; and short periods in Spain and Mexico.

Dr. Pollock is currently engaged in research on news media and foreign affairs and mass communications and public health and is now finishing a book to be published by Praeger on a survey he conducted of foreign correspondents.
