

I beg leave to call your attention to the fact that there is quite a number of Vagrants in the Town of Beaufort without any Public means of support and the Author [[?]] of the Bureau is invoked to take such steps as may in QM discretion be expedient to remedy this one. It is suggested that these offenders might by being put to work on the Streets of the Town be compelled to abandon their injurious habits and thereby render some service to the public.

Your attention is directed to an act of the Legislature of NC dated March 2d 1866. for a description of the Class of Offenders herein pointed out. You will perceive that the County is unable to bear the expense that would be necessarily inclined by an attempt to execute the provisions of that act and your [[?interposition]]would doubtless meet the approbation of the Civil Authorities and receive the thanks of the Community
