

Rochester Aviatrix Marks 50th Year of First Flight

NEW YORK, Feb. 26 (AP) — On a windy day in 1910, a girl in long, flapping skirts and Gibson-girl pompadour was taxiing a three-wheeled contraption of pipes, cables and oiled silk around a pasture in Hammondsport.

A gust of wind came along, and 18-year-old Blanche Stuart Scott became the first woman in America to take to the air.

The Antique Airplane Assn. is honoring tomorrow the indestructible little lady who is celebrating the half-century anniversary of that historic gust of wind.

After flying in — by airliner — from her home in Rochester, she reminisced in an interview about the early days of flying. She is a native of Rochester and returned to Rochester last fall from Howell, Steuben County, where she resided on the Greenwood-Conesteo Road.

She drove her first automobile at the age of 13 and was the first woman to drive an auto across the country "over wagon trails full of prairie dog holes, and many a broken spring."

The publicity from this cross-country trek was noted by Glenn L. Curtiss in Upstate New York, whose principal source of income was from daredevil exhibitions across the country of his pusher airplanes.

Curtiss suggested she join his crew of daredevils.

One day in September, 1910, she was in the Hammondsport pasture, going through what then passed for pilot training. In those days no budding flier ever took to the air except to solo — there was only room in the plane for one.

This day Curtiss himself was instructing her, and he had given her neither takeoff signal nor blessing. She had only been under instruction for three days. A governor held down the power of the motor.

But the gust of wind lifted the winged bird-cage about 10 feet off the ground. She was flying but, with no power to keep her in the air, quickly bounced down for her first landing.

"This gave me an excuse," she said, "to insist that they take the governor off the motor, and I began flying. What we actually did was hop. The plane was small and the field was big, so we would hop first 50 feet, then 75 feet, then 100 feet."

She made her first appearance as a "professional" in an exhibition at Fort Wayne, Ind.

When World War I came along, she sold her plane to the government and retired.
