Eve - Phil Hauser called to go with Louis, Dorothy & myself to a Burmese girl's party - (Florie) secretary to Hla Maung.

Chinese dinner & dancing, pleasant.

Sunday, Feb. 13 -

AM - Little work on U Nu - Afternoon Mary Caudle - to see about a portrait. Arranged with her for 350- first sitting Wednesday.

In evening - a dinner party in our garden for the artists - U Hla Shain & wife, Bo Let ya & wife, Mr. Mrs. Cassidy of Burma Amer. Institute, Mr. Mrs. John Baddeley,


Frederick (Fritz) Shoemaker, Mr. Mrs. Barnes. The Welsings. U Ba Kyi, Maung Tai Aye, Harry Ang, U Mo Lwin, Mo Lwin.

Ended with a discussion on problems of Burmese artists, with Louis introducing U Hla Shain who spoke of his article in The Guardian & mentioned the influence my drawings had made on his way of thinking. Quite revolutionary for an academician to advocate the 'middle way' - between conservatism & modern approach to art.

I urged them to start again - the Burmese Council or Association of Artists & to start working for a

1) Reduction of tariff on art supplies

- 2) Govt. Sponsorship of artists regarding commissions for decoration of public buildings, etc.
- 3) To hold out of door exhibits to bring art to public & stimulate interest in art.
