Fun talking to him. After the exhibit we walked through the older quarter of the city. Character of its own, mucho bruido, noise, life & color - shops, colors sounds. Went to a little Taverna for dinner. Dinner for two (with 2 bottles of wine) 50 pesetas \$1.25 with tip.

After dinner Manuelo had to take his motorcycle back to his house. (He had left it parked in front of the Ritz) to take me to the concert in a taxi. He rode his motorcycle, with me, following in a cab:

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
