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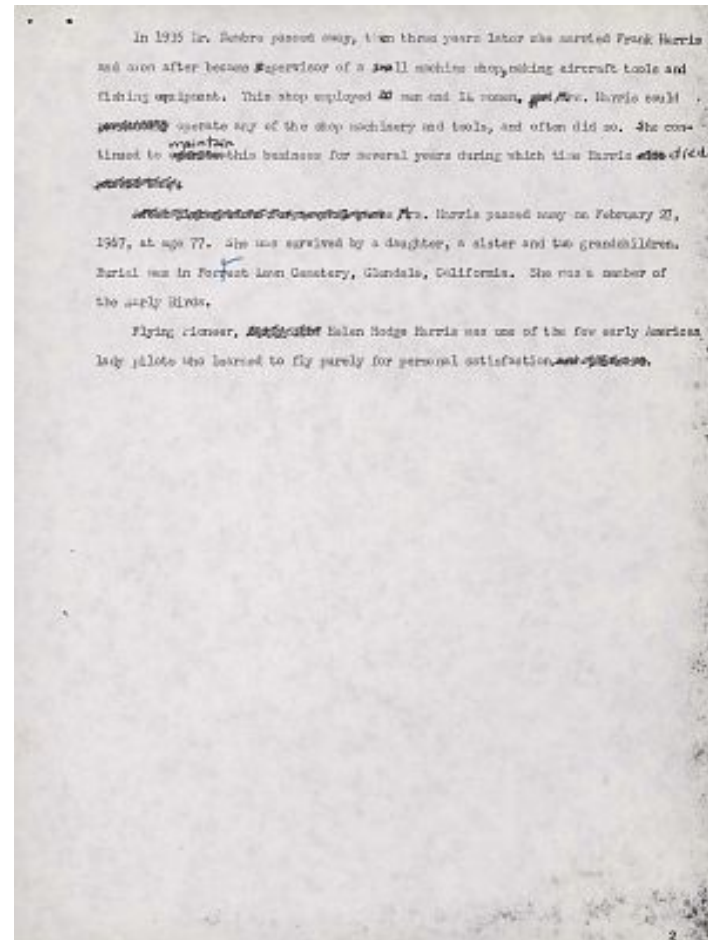
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In 1935 Mr. Newbre passed away, then three years later she married Frank Harris and soon after became supervisor of a small machine shop, making aircraft tools and fishing equipment.
