August 29, 30, 31, 1905.

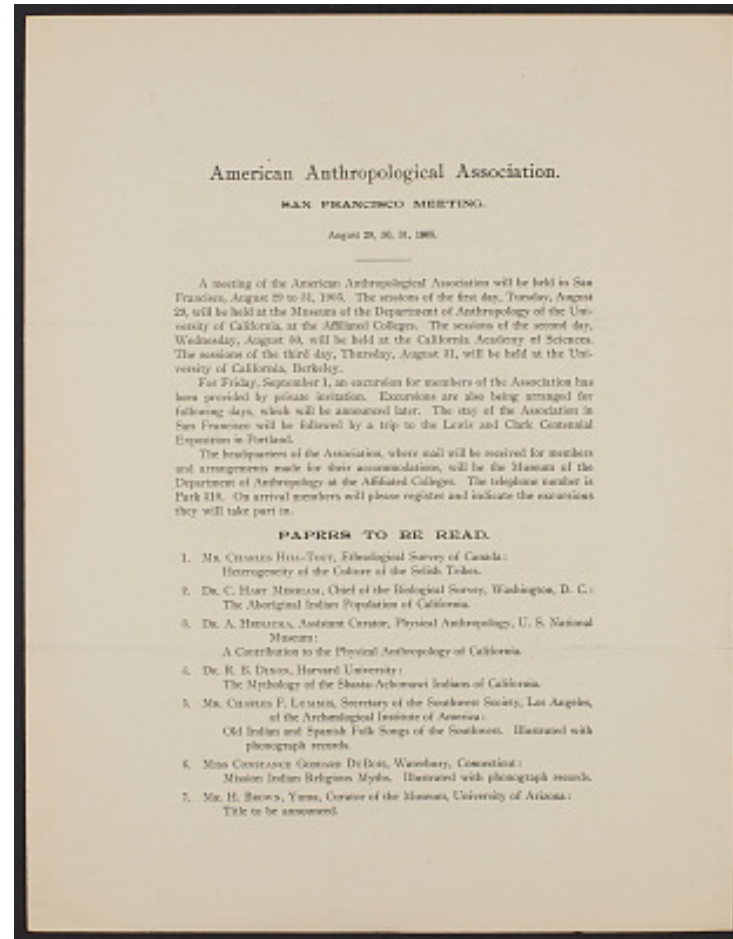
A meeting of the American Anthropological Association will be held in San Francisco, August 2 to 31, 1905. The sessions of the first day, Tuesday, August 2, will be held at the Museum of the Department of Anthropology of the University of California, at the Affiliated Colleges. The sessions of the second day, Wednesday, August 30, will be held at the California Academy of Sciences. The sessions of the third day, Thursday, August 31, will be held at the University of California, Berkeley.

For Friday, September 1, an excursion for members of the Association has been provided by private invitation. Excursions are also being arranged for following days, which will be announced later. The stay of the Association in San Francisco will be followed by a trip to the Lewis and Clark Centennial Exposition in Portland.

The headquarters of the Association, where mail will be received for members and arrangements made for their accommodations, will be the Museum of the Department of Anthropology at the Affiliated Colleges.
