70 tenements vacant

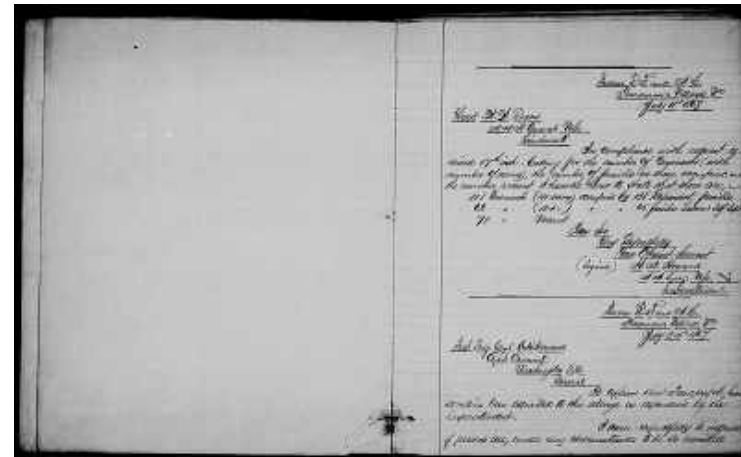
