Kilpatrick, a truck driver, was visiting her at the time and dashed into the storm to pull the tiny animals from the water. He gave them artificial respiration until they began breathing naturally. Then they were put in a box and planed on a milk diet.

### Safety Effort Lands Him In Hole

John Olofson, business agent of Local 20, Bricklayers' Union (AFL-CIO) feels he has a practical example of on-the-job safety.

The 59-year-old Waukegan man noted two uncovered holes on the first floor of a new dormitory under construction at Barat College, Lake Forest. He told laborers to cover the holes but an hour later, he said, both still gaped at him. So Olofson took some boards and covered a hole himself.

"That won't hold you," one of the workmen childed. "Yes it will," replied Olofson as he stepped onto the boards.

About 12 feet below in the basement, a pool of water broke his fall. He spent two days in Lake Forest Hospital, suffering from severe cuts and bruises.

"They tell me all the holes are covered up now," he said. "I hope this stands out as a permanent lesson in safety."

#### Bendix Air Race Will Start Here

One of America's famous airplane races will start in Chicago this year. The long distance Bendix Trophy event will originate here for the first time when planes leave O'Hare Field, Chicago International Airport on July 28.

The Air Defense Command announced that six top pilots, two each from the eastern, central and western areas, will fly from O'Hare to Andrews Air Force Base in Washington.

The six pilots will fly F-102 jet interceptors. Delta Dagger interceptors will also fly the 615-mile course-in less than an hour, according to a spokesman for the Air Defense Command.

Country To Profit On Recreational Lakes

A plan to create two new Forest Preserve lakes and make money on the deal was enthusiastically approved Monday by the Public Service Committee of the County Board of Commissioners.

Board President Dan Ryan said the county would net \$108,000 by selling earth to A.C.K Associates, a construction company that will excavate the lakes and use the earth to fill for the state's toll road system.

Both lakes, to be used for recreation, will be near the Des Plaines River in maine Twp. The larger one, 35 acres, will fill with backwaters from the river. The smaller one, 16 acres, will be filled by drainage from the surrounding watershed. If the county dug the lakes, Ryan said, the cost would be \$1,200,000. Work will be completed in about two years.

Refugee Is Happy; Lidice Stone Fixed

The Czech refugee who found a memorial in Licine, [[?]]. near Joliet, cracked and dirty, has seen his wish for its restoration come true. Charles Burian, 37, of 2929 W. Fullerton, the refugee, said that he felt better now that the stone dedicated to his native Czech town of Lidice, had been cleaned up. Lisice, Czechoslovakia, the scene of a Nazi massacre in 1942.

Burian's complaint stirred the Czechoslovakian National Council of Chicago to action and the litter near the monument has been cleared away. Flowers have been planted and a permanent caretaker hired by the Czech council.

"It is good now," Burian said. "The people of Lidice would be proud of this."

Safe Is Locked, \$40,000 Gone
