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Geo. W. Martin being duly sworn testifies that he lived at Capt. Smith's all the time the boy Jim lived there. Since the Surrender with exception of about a week, that the said boy a great deal of the time was confined to the home, unable to walk, having Rheumatism and was not able to work scarcely at all any of the time and was not worth his victuals and clothing during the whole time.

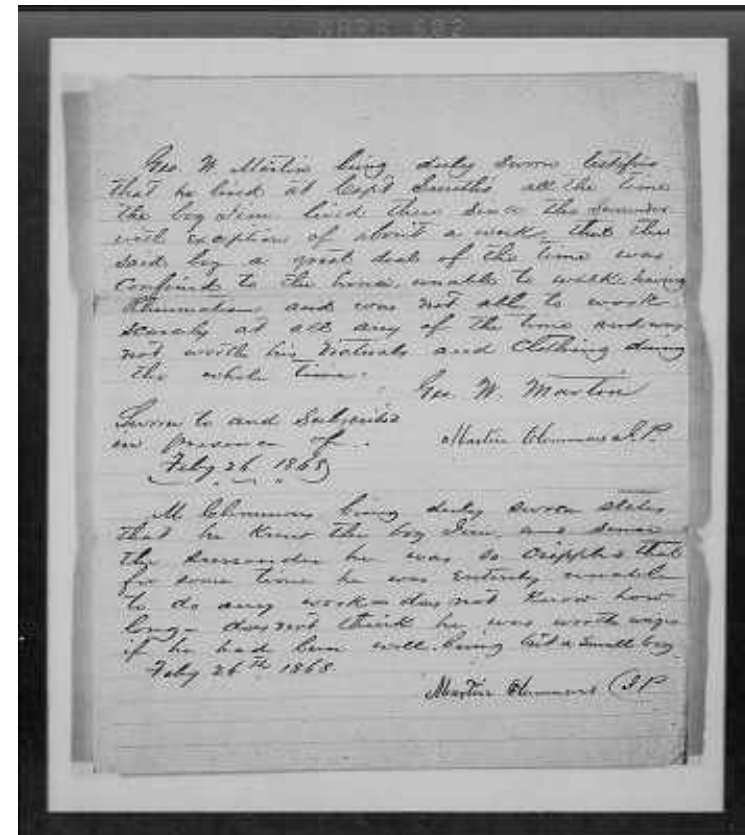
