
Colonel

I have the honor to transmit herewith vouchers of Dr J E Winants for medical services in performing amputation in case of boy named Guilford Smith, now an inmate of Bureau orphan Asylum.

I employed Dr Winants in the case by authority of endorsement from your office dated Sept 10th 1868. Dr. Myers being unable to attend to it in consequence of sickness, and in the opinion of the Surgeons who examined the case immediate amputation being necessary to save the childs life. Dr Winants Bill is very reasonable, and being about one half the legal rates.
