Dear Mr. Richardson:

This will be presented to you by W. D. WIlliams, of Tulsa, Okla., who is a student at Hampton Institute. He has been paying his way through Hampton Institute by, among other things, acting as a waiter in the Sherwood Forest Club, but has been compelled to go back to Tulsa by the illness of his mother. It may be impossible for him to return to Hampton this Fall unless he can work his way back. I have told him that I would ask your good offices in obtaining a position as an emergency dining car waiter, in order to aid his return. I know him to be thoroughly deserving person, and entirely competent as a waiter. I you can give him the opportunity to work his way back in this manner, I will very much appreciate it, and I know you will be helping where help is deserved and needed.

I thought it better to write you direct than to write Mr. Dickson or Mr. Wright, though I have not the pleasure of your acquaintance.


