

There won't be any telling until tomorrow morning whether this blessed ship will get here, and leave - it appears they are sometimes detained here for days. The town is packed with Americans waiting - I am lucky to be in a pleasant home with friends. If there are more delays I will write again - Yours ever John S. Sargent
