Forthcoming Exhibitions and Projects In Progress: 1983 and after. -"TOUCH SANITATION SHOW," early Fall, 1983, 3 weeks, massive total environmental multi-media exhibition in 2 parts: Part 1 'Transfer Station Trans Formation' at NYC Department of Sanitation's 32,000 square-foot Marine Transfer Station on West 59th Street and Hudson River (a real workplace), and at the same time Part 2 'Maintenance City / Sanman's Place', a one-person show at Ronald Feldman Gallery, Soho, 31 Mercer. In addition, each Part will be activated by a performance. Concluding with a panel on public art/work/class/culture.-Group Show (also includes Houston Conwill, Phillip Glass, Lauren Ewing, Lawrence Weiner, and Martha Wilson). March-May, 1983, Museum of the Town of Islip, L.I. Madeleine Burnside, Director and curator.

[-"Timely" show at major NYC gallery in connection with a publication. Still secret. January, 1984.]

"THE LANDFILL/THE PEOPLE." In progress. Collaboration with community/myself & communities living adjacent to sanitary-landfills for reclamation siteworks, in cooperation with the NYC Department of Sanitation. Since 1977.


"RE-RAW RECOVERY." Planning project for a design competition for artists, landscape architects, architects, earth creators, landfill workers, for landfill reclamation siteworks. In progress, in cooperation with the NYC Department of Sanitation. Since 1977.

In collaboration with Dr. Patricia Sexton, author of The New Nightingales, new book about hospital union organizing and work issues. Analogy: Sanitation as total city's health maintenance system / Hospital workers as individual person's health maintenance system. -"Revolving Door Spin-off: Necessary Work / Evil Work." Large installation in the revolving door entrance to the Old McGraw Hill Building Lobby Gallery; in "The Artist's Dilemma Show." Curator: Robert Costa. May. 1982.

-"Maintenance Art Mongo." Semi-retrospective, single person show at And/Or Contemporary Arts Center, Seattle, August, 1981. Curator: Norie Sato.

-"After the Revolution, Who's Going to Pick Up the Garbage on Monday Morning?" 22 hour performance with London "dustmen" [sanitation workers] concluding with a reception in their honor at the Institute of Contemporary Arts, and surprise participation of The Right The Honourable Chairman of the Greater London Council, Bernard Brook Partridge, November 17, 1980.
