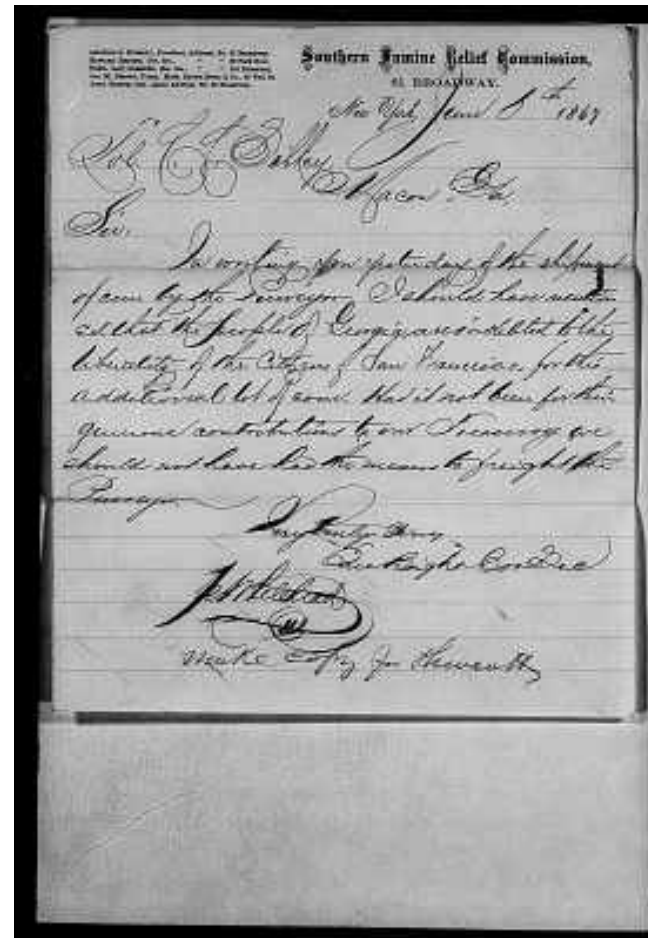
Sir:
