

## Georgia Assistant Commissioner, Letters Received, Entered in Register 2, A–G, Aug. 1866–June 1867, Part 2

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

I have been an earnest advocate for the education and elevation of the negro, since the close of the war. Not from any sentimental feeling of Philanthropy, but from self interest.
