Death has been among us! "Cudlargo" is dead!! He now sleeps beneath the Ocean's wave.

This morning "Smith" came to my birth & awaked me saying: "Cudlargo is dead". I immediately arose & found it indeed true. He died this morning at half past 4 o'clock.
