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

All the lacquered cans were decidedly superior to the unlacquered cans of which the tin was very strongly attached. I opened a can of shrimps and a can of asparagus which Baker has canned since last May 1912 with cans he had coated with Bakelite and which he considered excellent and superior to other lacquers. It seemed very good.
