[[/table]] [[line across page]] MEXICO, CANADA, AND ISLANDS OF CUBA, PUERTO RICO, PHILIPPINES, HAWAII, GUAM, The Republic of Panama and the U.S. Postal Agency at Shanghai, China have the same rates as for domestic mater noted above, except that matter, other than letters, which is closed against inspection, is unmailable. REGISTRATION. Letters or packages can be registered by adding stamps to the amount of 10 cents to the regular rate. REFORWARDING. Letters only will be forwarded from one post office to another upon the written request of the person addressed, without additional charge. Package forwarded or returned to sender require another payment of postage. SPECIAL DELIVERY STAMPS, at 10 cents each, used in addition to regular rates, insures delivery immediately on arrival at office of destination. These stamps can be used for no other purpose. The endorsement "Special Delivery", with ordinary stamps to the amount of 10 cents, in addition to regular postage, also insures "Special Delivery"

MONEY ORDERS. For orders not exceeding \$2.50, three cents; over \$2.50 and not exceeding \$5.00, five cents; over \$5.00 and not exceeding \$10.00, eight cents; over \$10.00 and not exceeding \$20.00, ten cents; over \$20.00 and not exceeding \$30.00, twelve cents; over \$30.00 and not exceeding \$40.00, fifteen cents; over \$40.00 and not exceeding \$50.00, eighteen cents; over \$50.00 and not exceeding \$60.00, twenty cents; over \$60.00 and not exceeding \$75.00, twenty-five cents; over \$75.00 and not exceeding \$100.00, thirty cents.

Packages of samples must not exceed 12 oz. in weight, 12 inches in length, 8 inches in breadth and 4 inches in depth (if a roll, 12 inches in length and 6 inches in diameter); but by special agreement between the United States and France, Great Britain, Belgium, Switzerland, Argentine Republic, Italy, Egypt, Austria-Hungary, Hawaii, Salvador, The Netherlands and British Colonies in America, Europe Asia and Africa, samples of merchandise, up to 12 ounces, are admissable to the mails.

Other mailable merchandise (not samples) weighing up to eleven pounds may be sent to practically all countries at the rate of 12 cents a pound, or fraction thereof by Parcels Post. Information regarding the special regulations governing the mailing of Parcels Post matter may be obtained at any post office.

Ordinary letters for any foreign country (except Canada and Mexico) must be forwarded, whether any postage is prepaid on them or not. All other mailable matter must be prepaid at least partially.

*The rate of 2 cents an ounce to Germany applies only on steamers sailing direct to German Ports. Via England or France regular foreign rates apply.
