After leaving the States - via Pearl Harbor, New Guinea I arrived in Manila where I went to a school for two more weeks.

After that I've done some work with different detachments on the different isles comprising the Philippines. Then a trip here to Korea - "Land of the Morning Calm" they call it - but not until we paid a visit to Okinawa and Tokyo.
