
Oct 17. Here all day. Feel old ill and tired. [[strikethrough]] and [[/strikethrough]]

Oct 19 (Sunday) Mr. [[red underline]] George Peet, Cary Hutchinson, Robert Bridges all here for lunch. [[/red underline]] They seemed to enjoy it much. Before I drove them here in motorcar we stopped for a few minutes on [[red underline]] the lon. Peet and Hutchinson [[/red underline]] showed me just near our mooring place on [[red underline]] Spuyten Duivil [[/red underline]] a large tulip tree which marks the landing place of [[red underline]] Hendrick Hudson [[/red underline]] where he had an interview with friendly Indians. That place which is the extremity of Manhattan Island is just in its original wooded condition and the rocks and trees give a fair idea of how the land looked at the time of the first white man's arrival.

Oct 20. Went to [[red underline]] Ion [[/red underline]] with Lewis and Warner and made successful trial run of engine since



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
