along Ocean shore. Boat behaved very well notwithstanding strong quartering breeze.

Tried fishing unsuccessfully then later on got slightly grounded at low tide but got off easily before night at high time and remained anchored before [[red underline]] Saltair settlement [[/red underline]] Coast guards came to offer their services Cold bright night Northern blowing Sept 3. Northern still blowing. Thermometer in my cabin was 63° F this morning. Moved anchor to better position. I went out in motor dinghy to explore neighborhood. Then went fishing in Inlet, caught one large flounder. Many fishing hoats, amateurs here. flounder. Many fishing boats, amateurs here.
