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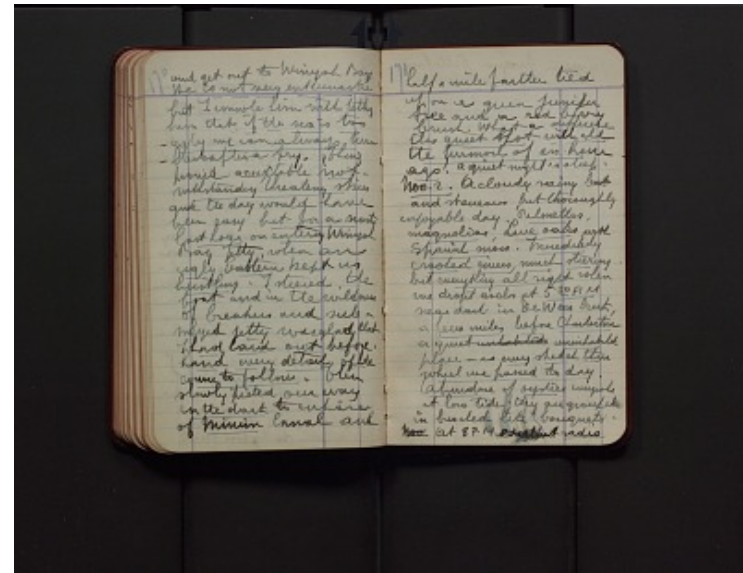
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and get out to Winyah Bay He is not very enthusiastic but I console him with telling him that if the sea is two ugly we can always turn back after a try. Thing proved acceptable notwithstanding threatening skies and the day would have been easy but for a nasty last hour on entering Winyah Bay Jetty, when an ugly Eastern kept us hustling. I steered, the boat and in the wildness of breakers and submerged jetty was glad that I had laid out before hand every detail of the course to follow. Then slowly our way in the dark to entrance of Mimim Canal and

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half a mile farther tied up on a green juniper tree and a red berry brush. What a difference this quiet spot with all the turmoil of an hour ago! A quiet night's sleep. Nov. 2. A cloudy rainy but and strenuous but thoroughly enjoyable day. Palmettos, magnolias, Live oaks with Spanish moss. Incredibly crooked rivers, much steering but everything all right when we dropt anchor at 5:30 P.M near dark - in De Wees Creek, a few miles before Charleston a quiet unhabited uninhabited place - as every stretch thru which we passed to day. Abundance of oysters everywhere at low tide. they are grouped in bunched like bouquets. Nov At 8 P.M excellent radio



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
