But the place is very quiet and reposeful and more desirable than during the hectic tourist season. Its special cottages on the hotel grounds and facing the sea and the trade winds seem particularly appropriate for bathing guests. The [[red underline]] whole road, coast and developments seems dead except for a few unpretentious bathers [[/red underline]] who came down in their motorcar with their family and in this quiet spots enjoy their bathing or fishing as if the whole ocean belonged to them.
