I shall make my meals as simple and as scant as possible. Daily swims and outdoor work will do the rest [[strikethrough]] Temp [[/strikethrough]] Hygrometer [[red underline]] 90% [[/red underline]] humidity but very comfortable altho 82°F for dry bulb and 78° for wet bulb. But fine trade-wind breeze makes one feel very comfortable. Threw out my northern clothes and am again in light white cotton trousers, and light cotton negligé shirt, no socks, my bare feet in light all cotton duck shoes. Hygrometer was 90% 76° F dry bulb 74° " wet bulb The flower which was slightly [[end page]] [[start page]] [[note in left margin in red]] Night blooming cactus [[/note in left margin]] pinkish while closed, now in opening turns whiter and whiter and its numerous pure white petals, open and spread as an exalted multiplied white lily while pistil and stamina [[strikethrough]] look like [[/strikethrough]] have [[strikethrough]] a la [[/strikethrough]] appearance of delicate lace work. At 8-9. P.M the flower is full open and emits a delightful perfume [[strikethrough]] whon the th [[/strikethrough]] At 4:30 A M. the flower was still wide open. But by daybreak it closed gradually and assumed the pinkish color and reduced volume of this morning While watching the flower I heard a speech by radio from the city of Cuernavaca [[underlined]] Mexico!
