March 23d 1867 | 32 Bell S. A. A. Surg. E.B.p.167 | Salisbury N. C.
March 18th 1867. Inquires if any means are existing in the Bureau by
which distressed adult females and children (freed) may be clothed. Has
25 almost naked in his hospital who are suffering for want of clothing.

March 26th * | 33 Balloch Geo. W. Chf. D.O. | Washington D.C. March
21st 1867 Requests that Bt. Maj. Thos. P. Johnston Chf. Qr. Mr. may
proceed to Washington on business connected with his Department.

March 26th | 34 Bowers [[?]] Mary (teacher) E.B.p.170 | Chapel Hill N.
C. March 26" 1867. Petitions the Bureau to pay the rent of a building for
her school at \$8.00 per month commencing Jan. 1st 1867.

March 28th * | 35 Bagley Wm H. | Raleigh N. C. Mar. 27th 1867.
Encloses pardon for Robert Davis sentenced to be hung at Greensboro
N. C.

April 1st * | 36 Brown O. Bvt. Brig. Gen. | Richmond Va Mch. 27" 1867
States that Emanuel Butts (Freedman) was murdered by Jas. Smith
near Great Bridge Norfolk Va. on the 13th inst. Gives a description of
the murderer.

April 1st * | 37 Bartholf John H. A. A. Surg. | New Bern N. C. Mch. 28th
1867. Makes application for leave of absence for 20 days to appear
before the Army Medical Board in New York.

April 4th | 38 Buchanan Tibby (col'd) E.B.p.180. | Salisbury N.C. Mch.
29th 1867 Applies for transportation from Salisbury N.C. to Richmond
Va. Her husband is a shoemaker in Richmond who is able and willing to
support her but not able to furnish her the means of transportation.

April 8th | 39 Bagley Wm. H. Priv. Sec. E.B.p.184 | Raleigh N. C. Apl.
6th 1867 Transmits letter of E. C. Wallace concerning the destitution
prevailing in Mecklenburg Co.


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April 8" 1867 | 40 Bolenius A. W. Bvt. Maj. E.B.p.188. | New Bern N. C.
April 5" 1867. Requests that a Surgeon be sent to New Bern during the
absence of Dr. Bartholf who has a twenty day leave of absence.

April 10th * | 41 Busbee Sidney A. Teacher of freedmans School
E.B.p.190. | Raleigh N. C. April 8" 1867. Reports the burning of his
school house at Snow Hill Greene Co. N. C. Apl. 4" 67, the murdering of
seven men Jan. 8th at the same place and various outrages upon the
freedmen. Requests Military protection for the freedmen of that place

April 11th * | 42 Badger R. C. Attorney E.B.p.191. E.M. 252. | Raleigh N. C. April 8" 1867. Transmits petition of Wm. James (colored) for wages due him by Thos. G. Coats, to the am't of \$353.75.

April 13th | 43 Blunt Masy [[?]] (col'd) E.B.p.197. 247. Ret'd June 7th 67 Filed | Salisbury N. C. Apl. 10" 1867. Applies for transportation for himself wife and one child, under 12 years from Salisbury N. C. to Kinston N.C. States that he is in a destitute condition and is liable to become a charge upon the Government for a support unless means are granted him of reaching Kinston where his parents reside and who would aid him.

April 13th | 44 Burgess Albert E.B.p.197. | Warrenton N. C. Jan. 1st 1867 Requests the Bureau pay the rent of the building in Warrenton used for freedmen School at the rate of \$9.25 [[?]] per mo.

April 19th * | 45 Bagley Wm H. Priv. Sec. | Raleigh N. C. Apl. 13" 67. Encloses letter from Victoria Wolf who shows a hard case of suffering. Recommends that ten bushels of corn be shipped to her address.

April 19th * | 46 Bagley Wm H. Priv. Sec. | Raleigh N. C. Apl. 18" 1867 Related to the distribution of the remainder of the Phil^a contributions of corn.

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
