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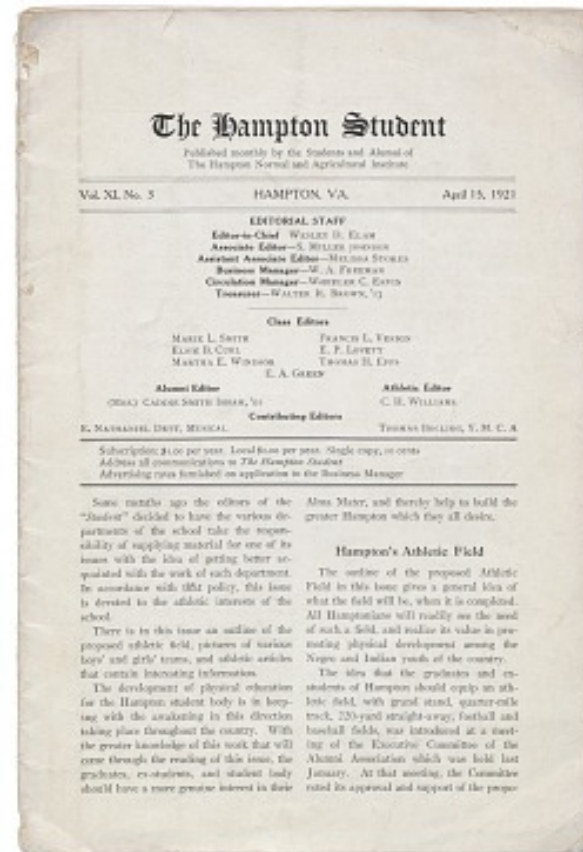
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Some months ago the editors of the "Student" decided to have the

Hampton's Athletic Field
