10th June 1934. A perfect day : all sunny & too hot for many insects about mid-day.
Drove, with C.W. Allen, to Cross Keys sandpit, near Batterjohn Big, Co. Meath, where collected for an hour; then in to ry. bridge over R. Boyne, 1 mile below Trim, Co. ME., where stayed till 2-30; then on to scrub on old bog road near Ballyhealy (W. of Ballinor) Co. WH., where collected till 6.30.
